

"The hearing was preceded by a list of thirteen demands to the Museum of Modern Art and demonstrations supporting them which emphasized artists' rights: legal, legislative and loosely political; they were the product of the newly named AWC.

1. The Board of Trustees of all museums should be made up of 1/3 museum staff, 1/3 patrons and 1/3 artists, if it is to continue to act as the policy-making body of the museum. All means should be explored in the interest of a more open-minded and democratic museum. Artworks are a cultural heritage that belong to the people. No minority has the right to control them; therefore, a board of trustees chosen on a financial basis must be eliminated.

2. Admission to all museums should be free at all times and they should be open evenings to accommodate working people.

3. All museums should decentralize to the extent that their activities and services enter Black, Puerto Rican and all other communities. They should support events with which these communities can identify and that they control. They should convert existing structures all over the city into relatively cheap, flexible branch museums or cultural centers that could not carry the stigma of catering only to the wealthier sections of society.

4. A section of all museums under the direction of Black and Puerto Rican artists should be devoted to showing the accomplishments of Black and Puerto Rican artists, particularly in those cities where these (or other) minorities are well represented.

5. Museums should encourage female artists to overcome centuries of damage done to the image of the female as an artist by establishing equal

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



The demagogy occurs in the use of sly speeches and slogans in apparent approval of militancy, he asserted, and the 'terror falls forth' when people 'actually stand on their constitutional rights.' ...

The trouble didn't start with the Panthers, he said—'the trouble started ages ago—400 years ago in slavery.' ...

[The conference] was a multi-racial crowd that gathered at the behest of the Panthers—blacks, Japanese, Puerto Ricans, Mexicans, a few Indians, but mostly young whites...

The crowd was lively and gave many of the speakers stating clenched fist salutes with shouts of, 'All power to the people.'...

Roberta Alexander, a Panther, declared that a struggle has been going on for months inside the party to clarify the roles of Panther women.

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
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Whether women are to type and perhaps perform sexual chores in the name of the party, or arm themselves like the men and share in the leadership is the question, she said.

'Black women are oppressed as a class, and black women are oppressed by black men. That's got to go, and it's going.' her fists struck the lectern.

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


The subject in this case would not be the Hancock Tower, but a humble subject that is a fixture in every neighborhood, a true multiple of the city—one of Chicago's characteristic, chunky, red, two-headed fireplugs. The scale I chose was that of a cobblestone, something I associated with revolutionary activity, though the plan to throw one plug through the window to launch the exhibition was never realized. As I made the Fire Plug Souvenir — "Chicago August 1968," it began to look somewhat like a teddy bear, and like a stuffed animal, it could be set down in different ways. For the opening of the Feigen exhibition fifty were arranged in different positions like an unruly crowd, and roses, which seemed a related shape, were scattered over them." — Claes Oldenburg in "Multiples in Retrospect."

"Three Untitled Projects [for 0 to 9]: Some Areas in the New York Area" (1969), is a set of three untitled books intended as independent works. The triptych publication expands on Adrian Piper's inquiry into spatial relationships as fixed constructions defined by the limits of the human mind. The work was widely seen, thanks to Piper's singular distribution of the books. The set of three volumes, packed in a manila envelope, was sent by mail—as an independent mail-art exhibition—to 162 artists, collectors, critics, curators, dealers, friends, writers, and others.

The names and addresses of those being sent the books were indexed in two columns on both sides of a loose sheet of paper that was included in the envelope, with a red dot placed next to the recipient's name on the list in the packet that he or she received: each recipient's address was thus designated as a location of the exhibition.

Each of these four elements—the three books and the index of names demonstrates a distinct means of documenting and naming locations. The first book records the locations found at the intersections of horizontal and vertical creases on a standard Hagstrom map of New York's boroughs; the second book illustrates the area of a randomly chosen block of a map of Manhattan—the area between Second and Third Avenues bordered by East Forty-seventh and East Forty-eighth streets, identically marked in red ink in each copy—proportionally translated into increasingly smaller dimensions; the third book deconstructs four sheets of graph paper, using descending grid sizes and various measurements for the boxes on each of the four sheets (1/4 inch, 1 pica, 1/8 inch, and ten squares to 1 inch, plus an equation to show how the fixed gridded scales could theoretically be extended to larger dimensions); and the sheet of the recipients' names and locations places the work in the here and now of the tangible world.

The effect of the second book is not unlike that of Kees Boeke's classic publication "Cosmic View: The Universe in Forty Jumps," which in forty "jumps" take a reader from a woman sitting in a chair with a baby in her arms to outer space, 2 billion light years away.

By putting the project directly in the hands of her influential intended recipients, Piper utilized one of the significant strengths of artists' books, which is to extend works of art to people—domestically and internationally—who might not otherwise see the work in a gallery setting.—Text adapted from "Adrian Piper: Unities," by David Platzker, in "Adrian Piper: A Synthesis of Intuitions," The Museum of Modern Art, New York, 2018



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

In 1968 Siegelaub recognized that having a physical gallery was no longer necessary for the presentation of works of art, specifically "conceptual" art could—or should—thrive best when liberated from the so-called antiseptic environment of white cube gallery space. Rather, books as disseminable objects could reach a broader, far more distributed, audiences.

"July, August, September 1969" is an example of one of these publications, documenting works by eleven artists producing outdoor works internationally.

One persistent commentary about the publication was it held a flavor of American imperial Manifest Destiny, an impression reinforced by the catalogue's covers denoting the locations of the works with dots marking the placement of the projects.



"When, in 1969, the Jewish Museum in New York commissioned Smithson to make a New Year's poster, he responded by applying the logic of the non-site to the Holy Land. In Smithson's design, a photograph shows that date, [5]730, written in Hebrew letters in red earth on a chalky ground. (The 5 is not actually there but is often left implicit in Hebrew dating.) The

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legend below—5730-RED CLAY FROM HEBRON PLACED AT MT. MORIAH makes it clear that this is a non-site: Hebron is a city some nineteen miles south of Jerusalem, and Mount Moriah is the Temple Mount, a site sacred to the Jewish, Christian, and Muslim faiths. Both Hebron and the Temple Mount were hotly contested sites in the aftermath of the Six-Day War of 1967.

A memorandum of March 13, 1969, from Jewish Museum director Karl Katz to the curatorial staff and the philanthropist Vera List (the poster's funder), sets out the thinking that went into the work.

It records a conversation with Smithson in which "the following idea of his was discussed":

A piece of interesting land on the site of Mt. Moriah (the navel of the world—the site where tradition has it God created Man) will be the ground for one set of numbers 5730 and the Hebrew equivalent letters. The numbers and letters will be made of the red earth selected from near Hebron (where tradition has it God found the earth to make Man). These numbers and letters on the ground will be photographed from above and the photo will be reproduced as a poster, reduced as the greeting card and postcard for the new Jewish year. The text will be simple and on the face of the poster. The text by Smithson will elucidate the image.

The figure 5730 marks the number of revolutions of the earth that had occurred since the purported moment of creation. The Babylonian Talmud states that the world was created from the Foundation Rock of Mount Moriah; God took soil from Hebron and used it to create the first human at the origin site of earth itself, i.e., the Foundation Rock. The displacement of earth captured in the poster's image is thus a recapitulation of the original displacement that occurred during the creation of man, a reframing of religious legend in geologic terms. God's sculptural act was not only the first work of art but also the first non-site. (The name Adam in Hebrew means "earth," and most etymologies see a connection between the Latin homo, man, and humus, earth.) For Smithson to recapitulate this gesture some 5,730 years later traces the human arc of history but also its insignificance from a geologic perspective..."—Alexander Nagel, "Art Out Of Time: The Relic And Robert Smithson," Artforum, October 2012.

This relevance is predicated of course on the scientistic links afforded by the map and the scale rule (although the scale is often violated in terms of sampling accumulated in the troughs.) In the 'Non-site,' Smithson, it seems to me plays with the inherited / syntax of Dadaistic permutables. 'Large scale becomes small,' Smithson writes. 'Small scale becomes large. A point on a map expands to the size of a land mass. A land mass contracts to a point.' ..." — from Robert Pincus-Witten's review of the show at Dwan, published in Artforum (April 1969).



The BAM engagement, Works for an Open Space, included two pieces, Generation and the New York premiere of Group Activities, that experimented with formal construction. In Generation, five dancers performed simultaneous solos, and in Group Activities, two groups of dancers performed the same choreography, with a caller keeping the dancers in sync. There was no reserved seating, and the audience sat on bleachers surrounding the stage. During this period, Tharp was also experimenting with site-specific work. But, unlike her avant-garde contemporaries, she embraced ballet, both its classical vocabulary and speedy athleticism. 


